QUORUM COURT MINUTES March 9, 2026

Judge Day called the meeting to order at 5:30 pm.

Invocation was led by Kenneth O'Connel with Sanctuary Church.

Pledge of Allegiance was led by Justice Forrest.

Roll was called and all were present except Justice Longmire.

Next order of business was the approval of the minutes of February 23, 2026, meeting. Justice Pasmore made the motion to approve, and Justice Tennison seconded the motion. Judge Day took a vote, and it passed unanimously.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Judge Day announced that last week we lost Mike Dickson, a loved county employee from the Circuit Clerks office due to an accident. He also stated that we lost Paul Irvin from the County Road department and Eric Johnson, the brother of a Road Department employee.

Judge Day mentioned that Justice Allison had asked about lease, utilities and insurance on a building currently owned by the county. He stated that currently the insurance on the building is \$2,940. One fourth of the building is leased and the remaining three fourths are occupied by District Court with utilities averaging \$375 per month. Justice Allison asked if District Court was housed in that specific building because she thought it only had one tenant. Judge Day stated that the building is full and that District Court is in that building.

Judge Day announced that there would be an exciting event at the meeting on 3/16/2026.

Judge Day asked MaryDawn Marshall, County Clerk about the upcoming Run Off Election for Secretary of State. Mrs. Marshall stated Early Vote would be Tuesday March 24th through Monday, March 30th from 8am-5pm with Election Day being on Tuesday, March 31st from 7:30am-7:30pm. She stated that Early Vote locations would be the usual Lake City courthouse and Jonesboro Election Annex while on Election Day all the Craighead County Polling sites will be open.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Monette Mayor Bob Blankenship approached, stating that in meetings earlier this year, discussions had been held regarding the purchase of a new building for use of District Court and how it would be paid for. He further stated that smaller cities in the county were concerned because of previously established budgets for the year, just like the county's budget. He then stated that in the minutes from that Quorum Court meeting, one of the Justice of the Peace made a comment that did not sit well with the mayors of the cities in the county, and if this comment was directed toward the mayors of the county, they found it to be insulting. He understood the comment to be that the mayors want all the things in the world, but don't want to pay for it. He then stated if Justice Williams was directing this comment toward the city of Monette, that he was wrong.

Justice Williams stated he would own- up to that comment.

Mayor Blankenship then stated he would appreciate clarification on the matter.

Justice Williams stated that you all want a new building, but no one wants to pay for that. He further states that he understands that we, the county, want all of that but at some point, we must figure out a way to pay for it. There was nothing directed against it, but just like fire taxes, etc., someone must figure out how and where funding will come from. He then reminded Mayor Blankenship that he'd just stated his city was broke.

Mayor Blankenship stated he did not say the city was broke, he said that their budget was set and they were limited on expenditures.

Justice Williams stated he did not want to spend that money, either.

Mayor Blankenship stated again that Justice Williams commented "they want the world, but don't want to pay for it".

Justice Williams stated that he did not say it that way.

Mayor Blankenship stated again that the comment was unappreciated by the mayors of the county. He further stated that we are here to help the county.

Justice Williams stated that "We are here because every time someone gets upset when something needs to be done, but there's no funds to do it."

Mayor Blankenship concluded that there are two big expenditures in discussion: a new facility for District Court and a new E911 Center, and that the Justice of the Peace and the County must find the money and the cities must find the money.

Robin Martin of 5005 Lamb Lane approached, stating that over the last three months, she had noticed something disturbing that reminded her of a scene from the movie Incredibles. She stated that more than half of our Justice of Peace are not engaged with the community.

She stated that they are here physically, but there was very little evidence of their mental involvement otherwise. She stated that many of them are only present to collect a paycheck and benefits. She also stated that they pass ordinances that many citizens speak disapproval of, yet no citizens speak to the approval of said ordinances. She asked for an update of the distribution of the remaining \$4 million ARPA Fund.

Judge Day replied that there was a check sent to City Water & Light for \$986,000 and that Crest has promised to have their spent by the end of 2026 by the deadline.

Martin asked if there were any other construction projects still being funded out of the ARPA fund.

Judge Day stated he would have to go back and check to be 100% sure.

Matt Redmon of 4109 Stephanie Lane approached, stating he appreciates the public attending these meetings to speak during Public Comment, that is the only time the entire Quorum Court is sitting together before they move on to Committees. He stated most of these meetings move very quickly, only lasting 20 minutes typically. He further states that for a governing body responsible for millions of taxpayers' dollars and major decisions about the future of Craighead County, the public deserves to see and have recorded reviews and discussion of appointments of board members. He references the County Code in Chapter 2 regarding administrative boards. He states that per code all administrative board members must be appointed by the County Judge. These appointments require confirmation from the Quorum Court. He states that in the case of the Library Board, it oversees an important public institution used by thousands of County residents. He states that the public deserves to hear the reasoning behind these appointments.

Rick Cooper of 379 CR 712 Jonesboro approached and handed out a printed statement to all the members of Quorum Court for review. He stated this is about the speed tables on CR 745. He states that even though he's heard so many people love the speed tables, the signatures he collected show 270 citizens against the speed tables of which 36 live on CR 745. He states there are car parts lying in the road and that the EMS vehicles were never considered before the installation of the speed tables. Response time is wasted by the speed tables because of how hard it is to get a fire truck stopped or going. He states that the speed tables cost around \$4,000 each and that we could easily install radar units in Deputy patrol vehicles for the same price.

Wayne Timmons of 4324 CR 745 approached, stating nobody asked the residents of CR 745 if they wanted or needed a speed table. He mentioned how inconvenient it is to have these in front of his property. He states an officer with radar sitting on the side of the road

occasionally would slow people down. He states that although the speed limit on that road is 35mph you must slow down to 5mph just to go over the speed table without tearing up your vehicle. He states that it is a noise problem when a trailer or anything being hauled goes over the table, causing walls in their home to rattle. He further states that there are already bolts coming up out of the speed tables. He concluded by stating that when he spoke to a few JPs, they knew nothing of the speed tables and when he called the Judges office, he was advised to call the road department who then referred him to the sheriff's department and was advised there were a lot of speeders on that road. Once he researched it, he found that there has never been a speeding ticket written on CR 745.

Cody Liles of 113 CR 7890 approached, stating that passing the speed tables this afternoon on CR 745 he noticed that the one in the southbound area is already broken with lag bolts visibly coming up out of it. The 2021 Arkansas Fire Prevention Code states that any calming traffic devices need to be approved by a Fire Code official. He asked who was the individual that approved of it.

Judge Day replied that he was not aware there was a state fire code for installing speed tables.

Justice Cook asked if with this many people voicing their concerns over the speed tables could we take the speed tables out and have a study done.

Judge Day replied that we could, but the speeding on CR 745 had been going on for around 3 years with multiple calls to the sheriff's office for complaints such as mailboxes getting knocked over and kids nearly getting run over. They hoped putting the speed tables in would make people think twice about speeding through that area. He then stated that he had gotten several phone calls and comments thanking him for making the county roads safer and some even asked to have one put in on their roads.

Justice Cook asked if speeding was that big of an issue on CR 745 what would it cost for one of the cameras that takes a picture of your license plate if you speed and they mail you a ticket.

Judge Day advised that one of those cameras is illegal in the state of Arkansas unless in an ARDOT construction zone.

District Court Judge David Boling approached stating that he noticed several discussions of what to do with District Court since they had to vacate the 410 W. Washington location back in June of 2025. He stated he appreciates the concern and input of the mayors of Craighead County cities. He stated that District Court takes care of all the municipalities in Craighead County for things such as misdemeanor citations and traffic citations. Arkansas Law requires us as a body to have an interlocal agreement with each city and Quorum

Court discussing how District Court is funded and how it should operate. Every two years, he along with Judge Tommy Fowler and Head District Court Clerk Bridgett Clifft have a meeting with all the mayors to give an update on District Court affairs. During the most recent meeting in January of 2026 Judge Boling spoke on key data points. The first being the structure failure at the previous location of 410 W. Washington. He stated that since being relocated, District Court has been operating in temporary locations such as the courthouse on 511 S. Main Street, the 4th floor of the original courthouse annex at 511 Union Street, 603 S. Madison, and finally Mike Gott and Warren Dupwe's old building at the corner of Jefferson and Madison. Judge Boling spoke of the current size of the courtroom for District Court. Judge Boling stated that the old facility at 410 W. Washington had 2 courtrooms available for District Court with capacity of around 300 people. The current location is one courtroom with capacity of 50-75 people causing crowding in the hallway of the 4th floor of the annex. He also stated that even with the reduction in size of the courtrooms they have not reduced the size of their dockets in efforts to give the citizens access to justice. He stated that if someone receives a citation to appear in District Court it takes approximately 60 days to get in front of a District Court Judge and if you plead not guilty it will take another 6 months to be on the docket for a trial. He then stated that if the current set up for District Court becomes a permanent location without modifications it will only get overworked. The issue at hand is finding reasonable space, so the citizens, victims and defendants have access to justice in a timely fashion. Judge Boling stated that in speaking with the Chief Bailiff, Marcus Gragg, he asked in June of 2025 what the average daily number of people coming into the courthouse was. Gragg stated an average then was between 200 & 250 people. Judge Boling then asked Gragg what the average looks like now since June 27, 2025. Gragg replied that now anywhere from 500-700 people a day with Monday-Wednesday being bigger court days there is an average of 1,000 people. Judge Boling states that the overcrowding on court days of the 4th floor in the original annex is causing more disruptive behavior causing additional strain for the law enforcement agency. At the January meeting they presented a 3-year look back at what District Court has done. In the last 10 years he has been in office the District Court has never gone over budget, showing that they are good stewards of the public's money. Cumulatively returning approximately \$285,000 to the county over the last 3 years. The collections of District Court that are issued by the citations of the law enforcement are at the highest they have been in the last 10 years. The District Court collected approximately \$4.45 million in fines and fees in 2025. He then states that the cities mentioned earlier are receiving around \$1.88 million in distribution. Judge Boling asked if District Court should stay at the current location of 511 Union, look for an existing structure to renovate, or build new. He then stated what was discussed was building new on the property already owned by the County such as the lot across from the Election Annex on Jefferson. He then referenced the question about

expanding out at the County jail. Judge Boling stated some of the issues would be a separation from the current Court Complex, limited public transport, and walkability issues for those who walk. Judge Boling concluded that this is a discussion for a long-term solution and is asking that the Quorum Court take a feasibility study to see what a long-term solution looks like for District Court.

Justice Cook asked Judge Boling how many square foot the building at 410 W. Washington is. Judge Boling replied that the lease for District Court was around 15,000 square feet cumulatively. Justice Cook asked if a new facility is being built for District Court how many square feet they would need to operate District Court. Judge Boling stated that he isn't sure. Justice Cook asked if we build and you need seats for 300 currently, why not do this right and not come back 3 years from now and need more. Judge Boling states that having the feasibility study done will help the decision process. He then stated that 2012 was the last time a District Court position was added in Craighead County and that since 2012 the numbers population wise are up 23 percent. Looking at the current case load they have, there should be 3 to 4 sitting Judges for District Court, but they aren't asking for that because they are able to handle the current load. For the long term there is possibly a need for enough space for 3 District Court Judges to help prevent the long waiting period for the first court date and lower the failure to appear cases.

Justice Rogers asked if there is a recently built District Court in the state that would be something comparable to what is currently needed. Judge Boling stated the most recent is North Little Rock, but it wouldn't be a good comparison because they are housing offices that Craighead County District Court wouldn't need to house.

Justice Cline asked if the size of the courtroom on the 3rd floor of the 511 S. Main Street Courthouse is what is needed. Judge Boling replies that it is probably a good size, but if District Court operates 3 different court rooms, they don't all have to be the same size. He further states that different types of court sessions require different sizes of courtrooms.

Judge Day states that the County is working with the cities to get a new Interlocal Agreement proposal to make District Court officially a County Court and it will take some of the fees that the host cities, Jonesboro and Lake City, have been getting will then be set aside to benefit all cities in Craighead County.

District Court Judge Tommy Fowler approached thanking everyone. He stated that if the Quorum Court would look at a recent study by DCRAB, who oversees the allocation of District Judges for the counties and municipalities, Craighead County should have 3 ½ to 4 District Court Judges. He then states that the cities and county are going to need a new bigger facility to accommodate the growth of our county.

Judge Day asked if there was any further Public Comment and there was none.

Motion to adjourn to committees was made by Justice Cline and seconded by Justice Forrest. All Justices present were in favor.

Meeting adjourned at 6:20 pm.

ORDINANCE NO. 2026- _____

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE 2021-21 AND ORDINANCE 2022-009, 2023-01, and 2025-18 UPDATING THE CRAIGHEAD COUNTY SALARY ADMINISTRATION POLICY FOR COST OF LIVING, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

WHEREAS, Quorum Court implemented the Salary Administration Policy with Ordinance 2021-21 and

WHEREAS; the JESEP committee regularly meets and review the needs of employees and salary adjustments, and

WHEREAS; the Quorum Court desires to reward Craighead County employees with good benefits and retain employees, and

WHEREAS; the Quorum Court concurs in the importance of changing the current Salary Administration Policy and for providing discretionary needs for the elected officials and ability to provide and give cost of living adjustments for employees who have been employed for 90 (ninety) days, and

WHEREAS, the Quorum Court desires to allow other department heads and elected officials flexibility to meet the needs of retention.

NOW THEREFORE be it Ordained by the Quorum Court of Craighead County, State of Arkansas as follows:

SECTION 1. Ordinance 2021-21 adopting the Craighead County Salary Administration Policy shall add the following language:

II. Salary Adjustments

- A. Types of increases shall include "Cost of Living Increase".

SECTION 2. Ordinance 2021-21 adopting the Craighead County Salary Administration shall add the following paragraph:

- K. Cost of Living Increase.

Employees who have been employed for a minimum of one year shall be eligible for a Cost-of-Living increase. The supervisor of the employee may provide the Cost-of-Living Increase prior to the one-year anniversary if the employee has satisfactorily performed in accordance with the discretion of the supervisor and

has been employed for no less than 90 days. The rate may be reflective of the consumer price index, but that rate is not conclusive in the determination.

SECTION 3. Severability. If any provision of this ordinance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the remaining provisions of the ordinance which remains effective absent the invalid provision, and to this end, the provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable.
